United States Rubber Buys Old Straw Hat Works at Milford.

For the purpose of manufacturing gas masks and other kinds of rubber goods the United States Rubber Company, of which the Hartford Rubber works is a subdivision, has bought the old Milford straw hat works at Milford. Within a few weeks the new plant will open, employing 400 to 500 men and women. The first article to be manufactured in the new factory will be the traveling bag; then there will be also ponchos and rubber blankets for the army. Negotiations for the pincing of gas mask contracts have made good progress and as soon as the government's experts have determined on the details of the type sample, the contracts will be placed and the work on the order will proceed.

The Milford rubber works will be under the management of the Goodyear Metallo Rubber Shoe Company of Naugatuck of which Charles R. Haynes is superintendent. Wallace Harney, who has been assistant foreman in the L. Candue & Co.'s rubber works of New Haven, will be the local superintendent.

The plant is now being altered to suit the requirements of a rubber factory and a considerable amount of machinery is to be installed. There is in all about 76,000 square feet of floor space with enough land about the plant to permit extensive ex-pansion. The nature of the work is pansion. The old Milford straw hat works was established about 70 years ago, but has been closed since last July.
